The Meeting: The meeting was conducted as a Zoom hybrid. Select Board Members Aria Eee, Katie Goodwin, and Kathy Gravino, Town Administrator Tyler Washburn, and Finance Director Mary McDonald were together in the Town Office. There were 15 members of the public in attendance on Zoom.

The minutes of the meeting of April 14th & April 28th, 2026, were approved.

Most Important/Interesting Items: In my judgment, the following items were the most important things covered during the meeting.

- TOPMB has advised the Select Board that there is a sinkhole on the left side of the entrance of the wharf in Five Islands. A complete repair is not possible at this time without disruption to wharf access during the busy summer season. A temporary repair will be made to ensure a safe summer season and planning will begin for a permanent repair
- The Select Board met with Town Counsel to discuss Municipal governance structure as it pertains to the Citizen Petition to increase the size of the Select Board to 5 members that will appear on the Town Warrant at Town Meeting. This warrant item will be discussed at the Ordinance Hearing on May 26th. The pros and cons provided by Town Counsel will likely be presented at that time. 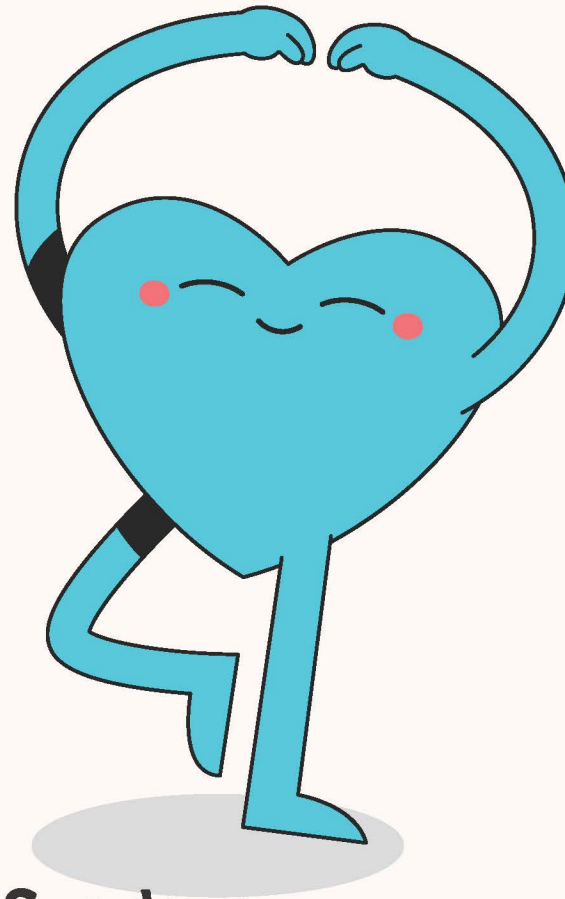

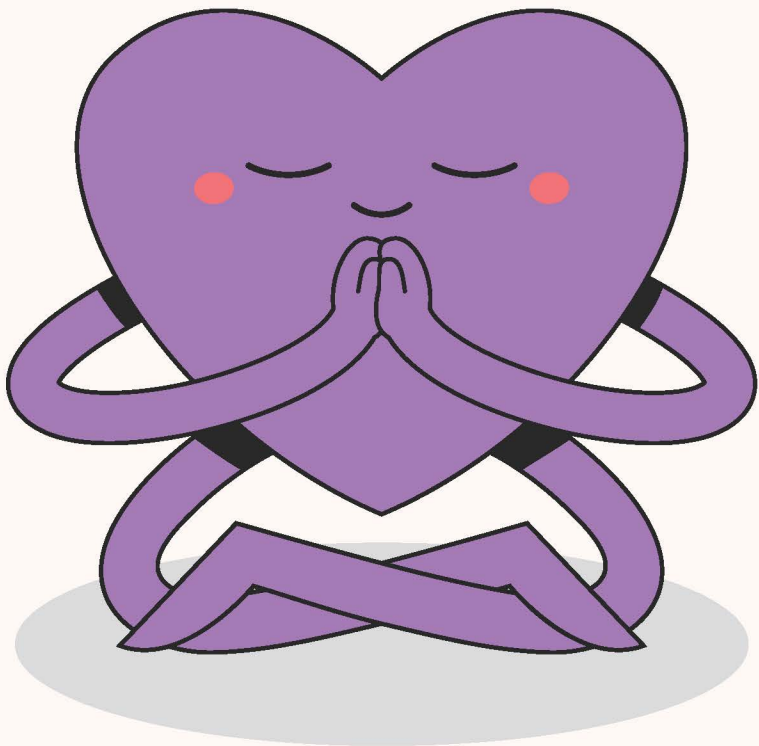

Under Maine law, municipal assessors must annually certify to Maine Revenue Services (MRS) the ratio of assessed value to just value in their municipality. This certified ratio must be used by the assessors to adjust the value of certain exemptions in the municipality, including the homestead exemption. As part of the process for determining municipal reimbursement for the homestead exemption, assessors must declare their certified ratio to MRS by June 1 each year. Please review the below options for declaring the certified ratio. MRS will accept the ratio declared by an assessor if it is within 10% of the developed parcel ratio determined by MRS for the municipality as part of the most recently completed state valuation. If the ratio declared by the assessor differs by more than 10% from the developed parcel ratio, the assessor must provide evidence showing the ratio declared is more accurate for one of the reasons under Option #2 on page 2.

Option #1: The municipality declares the developed parcel ratio of 91%, determined by MRS as part of the 2026 state valuation, as the certified ratio for 2026.

Option #2: The municipality declares a current year certified ratio that differs from the developed parcel ratio in Option #1.

If this ratio is not between 82% and 100%, select a reason and attach supporting evidence. If insufficient proof is included with this form, MRS will only accept use of the developed parcel ratio in Option #1 and will adjust reimbursements received by the municipality accordingly.

But today, too many current and future teachers struggle to see how they can afford to stay in their careers. In 2023, the Maine Education Policy Research Institute found in a survey of students majoring in education that **81%** of respondents cited pay as the biggest perceived drawback to a career in education.

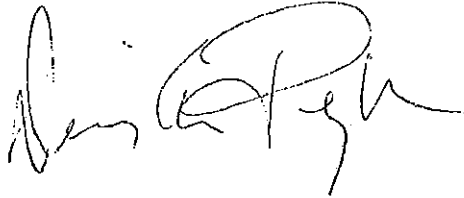
We can't afford to lose our teachers to other states.

That's why, this year, the Maine Legislature raised the minimum teacher salary to \$50,000. By gradually raising the minimum salary over the next few years, we're not only supporting our educators — we're protecting Maine's future. 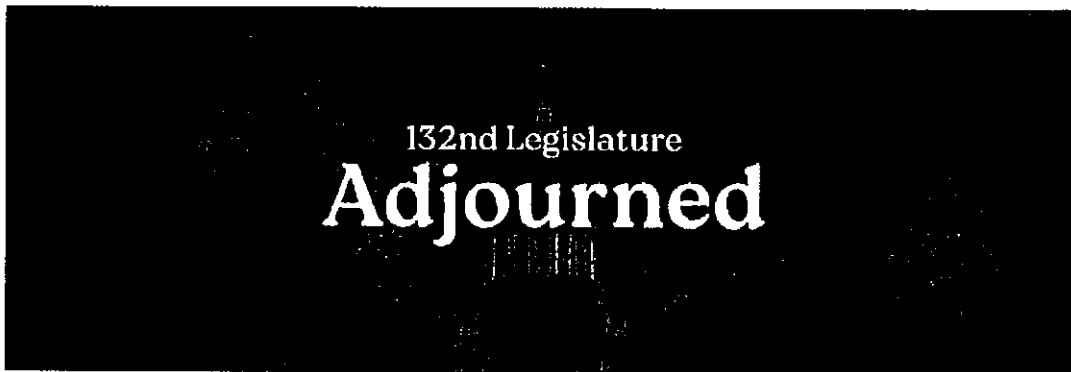
As we celebrate Teacher Appreciation Week, I can't think of a better way to truly say "thank you" to the folks who are shaping the next generation.

THE 132nd LEGISLATURE HAS ADJOURNED



Last week, the Legislature adjourned *sine die*, meaning that we are officially finished with the Second Regular Session after having a chance to override two vetoes from the Governor.

I supported the proposal to place a moratorium on new data center projects so we can better understand their impacts before they move into our communities. That measure originated in the House and did not advance to the Senate for a veto override vote, but I would have supported it had the opportunity come before me.

In the Senate, I voted to overturn the veto of a bill that would help folks with low-level criminal offenses (like outdated cannabis convictions) have a better shot at accessing employment and housing once they've paid their debt to society and stayed on the right side of the law.

Unfortunately, these veto overrides did not receive the necessary two-thirds support in the House and Senate, and neither will become law.

It has been an honor to represent you in Augusta during the 132nd Legislature and pass several laws that will lower costs for our families, defend Maine's way of life and protect our rights.

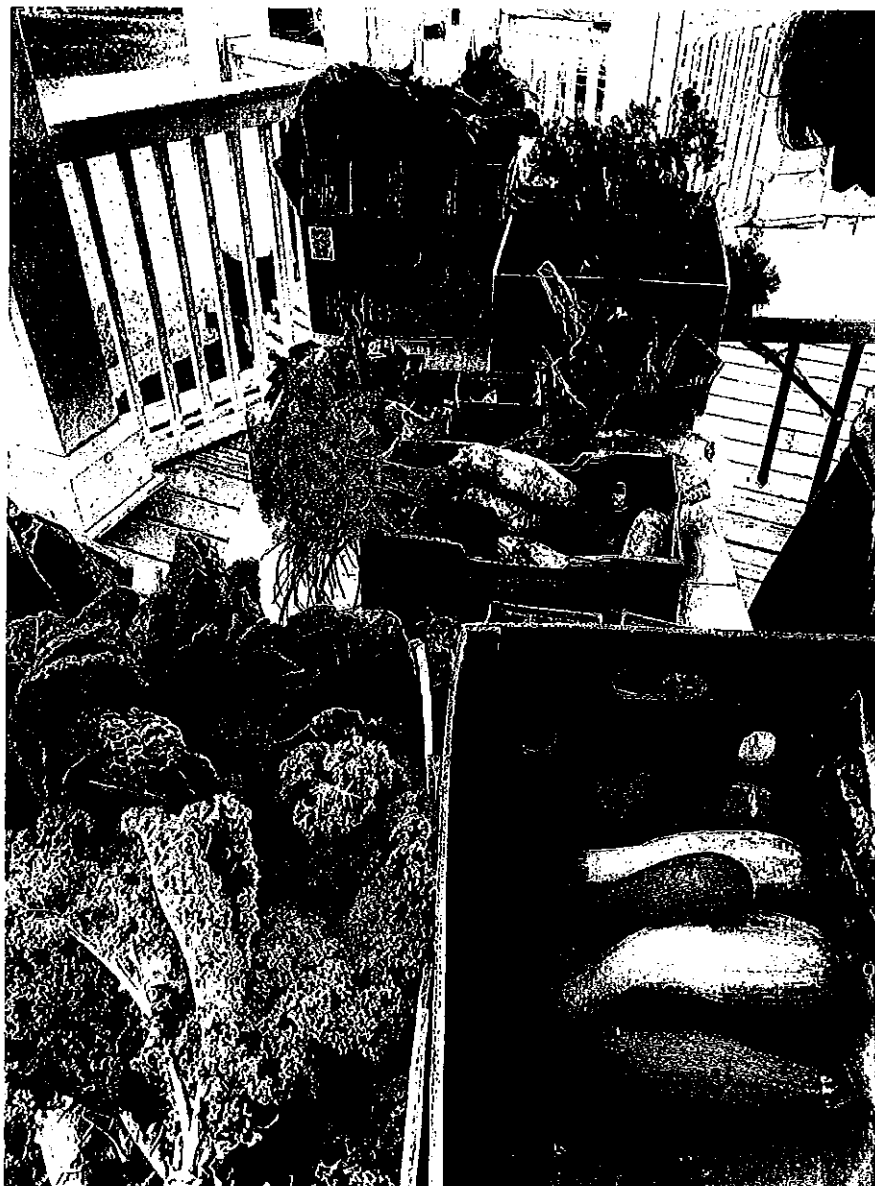

Last week, Gov. Janet Mills ceremonially signed my bill into law to establish a demand response program designed to help Mainers reduce their utility bills. LD 2140 directs Efficiency Maine to establish an opt-in program incentivizing utility customers to reduce electricity usage during peak demand hours, lowering monthly bills and strengthening grid resilience in turn. 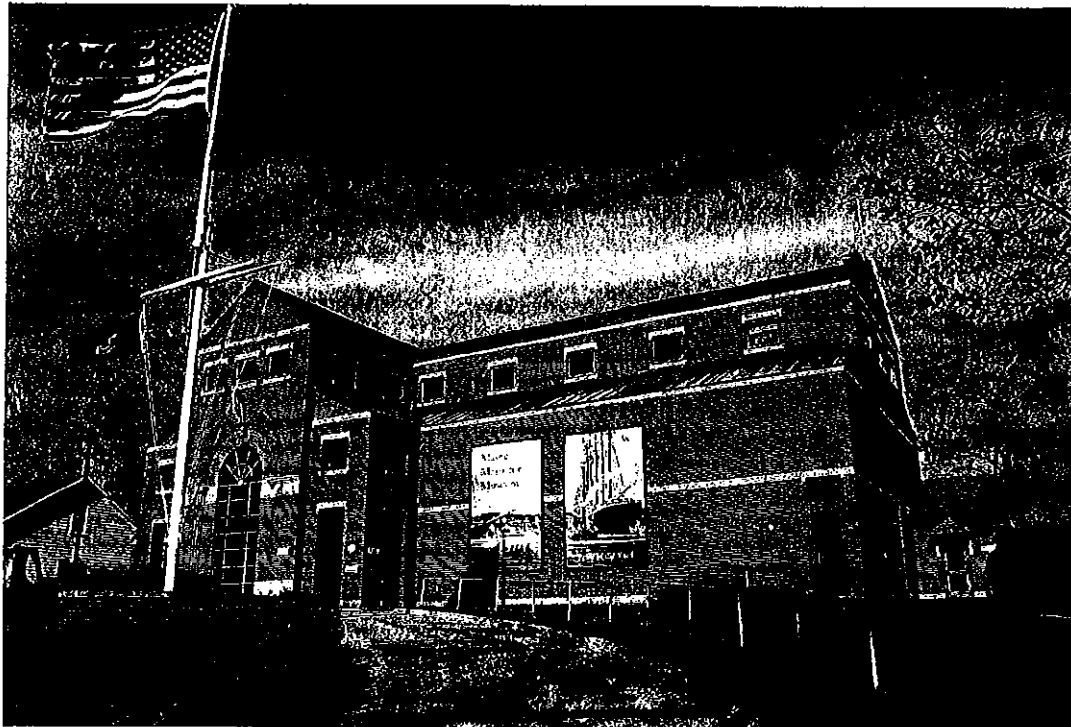
FREE FRESH PRODUCE WITH THE SHARING TABLE

Hello,

I wanted to share an opportunity I've been researching that I believe could significantly benefit both our students and the broader community.

The Maine Community Foundation offers a Community Building Grant program that supports projects strengthening community spaces, accessibility, civic participation, and local connections. Grants are awarded for up to \$10,000, and based on the program priorities, I believe our school gymnasium sound and acoustic improvement project could be a strong fit.

As we've seen during school performances, assemblies, town meetings, voting, and other community events, the gym serves as far more than a school space—it is one of the community's primary indoor gathering places. The recent variety show especially highlighted how much we rely on this space, and how difficult it can be when sound quality limits students' ability to be heard and community members' ability to fully participate.

I have started drafting a grant narrative focused on improving accessibility, sound clarity, and the long-term usability of the gym for both educational and civic use. My goal is to position this not simply as an equipment request, but as an investment in one of our community's most important shared spaces.

The next application cycle is expected to open in November 2026, with applications typically due in February 2027 and awards announced in June 2027.

Before moving further, I wanted to make you aware of the opportunity and see whether the school would be interested in supporting the application. School support—whether through project input, facility details, usage information, budget estimates, letters of support, or other collaboration—could strengthen the application considerably. I'll be approaching the town for similar support.

I'd be happy to share the draft narrative and discuss whether this is something worth pursuing together.

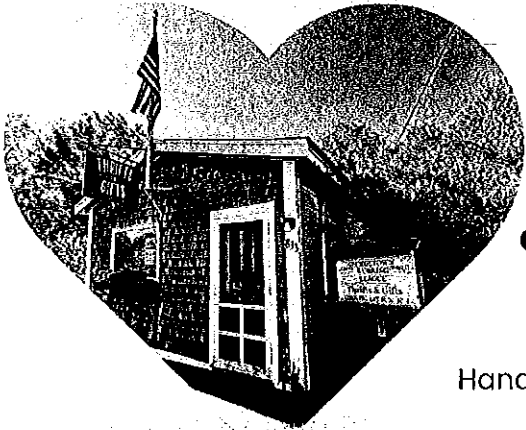

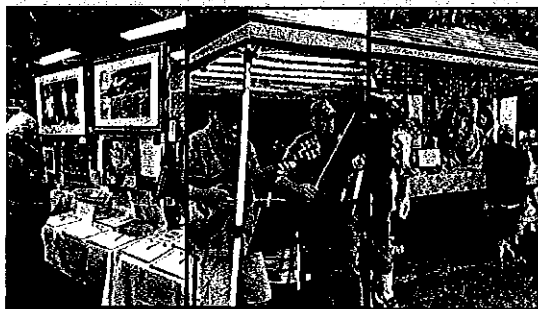
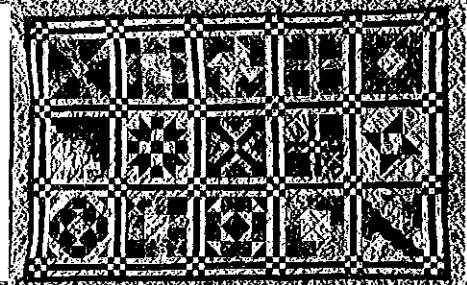
