PROCLAMATION OF THE GEORGETOWN SELECT BOARD

Declaring Georgetown a Working Waterfront Community

Adopted _____, 2026

WHEREAS, Georgetown's identity, history, economy, and culture are deeply connected to the waters, shores, coves, islands, harbors, mudflats, wharves, boatyards, marinas, and marine businesses that have sustained generations of residents, families, and enterprises; and

WHEREAS, Georgetown has long been home to a vibrant and diverse working waterfront that includes, among other activities and enterprises, lobstering, clamming, aquaculture, worming, commercial harvesting, boatyards, marinas, marine services, and supporting businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board recognizes that working waterfront activities are essential to Georgetown's local economy, maritime heritage, food systems, public access, and sense of place; and

WHEREAS, Georgetown seeks to protect, support, promote, and advocate for a commercial marine base that remains successful, resilient, diverse, and in harmony with the broader community; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board recognizes that residents, businesses, visitors, real estate professionals, and prospective property owners benefit from clear public notice that Georgetown is, and intends to remain, a working waterfront community; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board further recognizes the importance of maintaining natural resources, waterways, infrastructure, and access that allow current and future commercial marine enterprises, residents, and visitors to engage with and benefit from Georgetown's working waterfront; and

WHEREAS, this proclamation is intended as a public affirmation of community values and priorities and does not create fines, penalties, enforcement provisions, or restrictions beyond those otherwise provided by applicable law.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Georgetown Select Board PROCLAIMS that the Town of Georgetown is hereby declared a **Working Waterfront Community**.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that Georgetown proudly and publicly affirms its intention to remain a welcoming Working Waterfront Community that supports the people, families, businesses, and marine enterprises that depend upon and contribute to the Town's waterfront.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Select Board encourages public understanding of the vital role of the working waterfront and the conditions needed for it to thrive, including continued commitment to access, infrastructure, natural resources, and balanced community development.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Town will endeavor to communicate this designation through appropriate public means, including the Town website, outreach to Georgetown residents and businesses, the Maine Association of Realtors and signage or other notices as determined by the Select Board.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Select Board supports efforts to preserve Georgetown's working waterfront integrity while respecting applicable Town, County, State, and Federal laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.

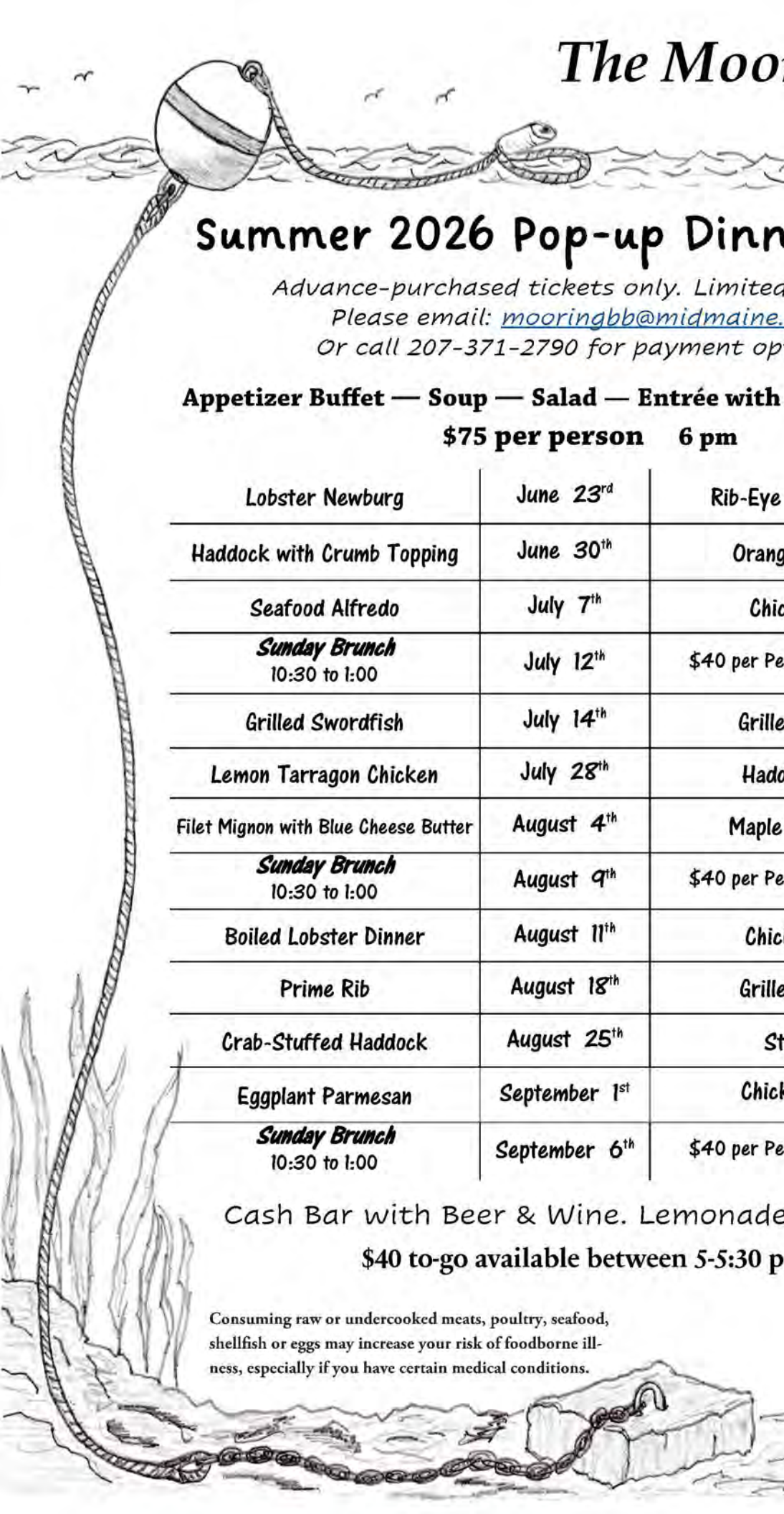

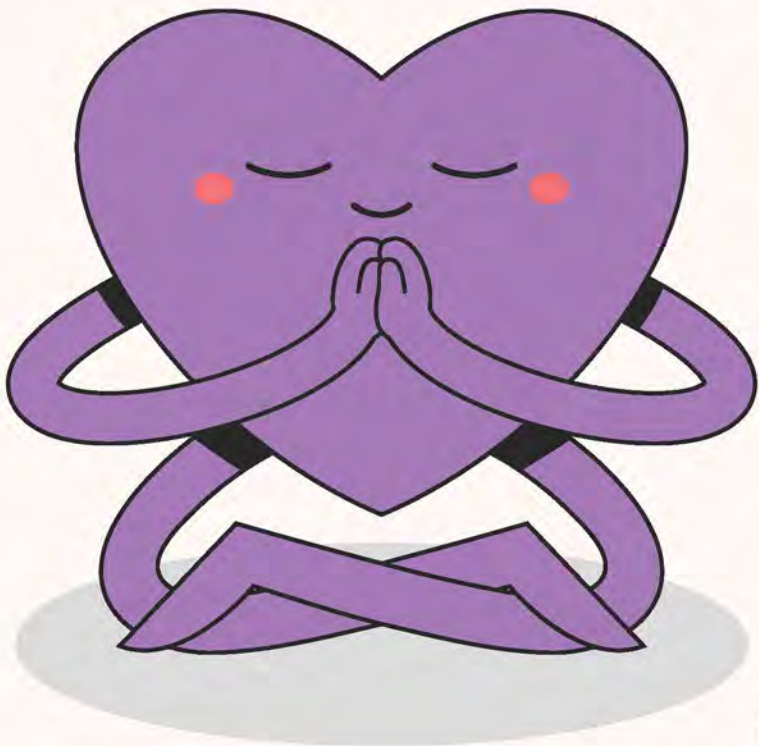

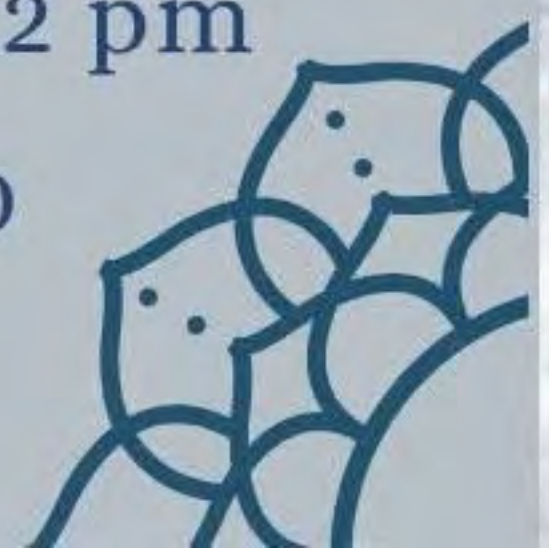

Resource Reminders

- NEW [The Maine Affordability Payment Program](#) ("the program") was approved by the Maine Legislature to

support Maine residents who are considered to be disproportionately affected by Maine sales and excise taxes. The program is administered by Maine Revenue Services (MRS). MRS will issue \$300 affordability payments to eligible recipients beginning in late July 2026.

- **MaineHousing's Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP)** *will begin to accept applications for the upcoming winter heating season on August 3.* HEAP is meant to help cover a portion of an eligible household's annual heating costs. The program prioritizes households with vulnerable members, including those who are over the age of 60, under the age of 6, or living with a disability. Applying for the program early can ensure funds are available when they are needed later in the heating season.

Severe Shortage of Critical Blood Donations, by Jennifer Rooks, Jonathan P. Smith,

The American Red Cross Northern New England Region

The American Red Cross is sounding the alarm over a worsening blood shortage. Inventories of some of the most-needed blood types—including Type O—are at crisis levels. We'll discuss the critical role of blood donations for trauma and emergency care, different options for donating blood, and the impact of shortages on surgeries, cancer treatment and more.

1983 v. 2032: The Economics of the Last and Next Social Security Reform, By Kathryn Anne Edwards, rooseveltinstitute.org, August 4, 2026

The Social Security trust fund is projected to be depleted in 2032. At that point, an automatic cut to benefits of around 20 percent will be implemented to rebalance the program's long-term finances—unless Congress passes a reform that balances the program before the fund runs out. Many Americans view the trust fund's depletion as inevitable, the inexorable result of demographics. This view stems from understanding Social Security as basically a pyramid scheme: Workers pay in, retirees get out, so the ratio between them underpins the program's stability. People live longer and have fewer kids, ergo, Social Security is running out of money.

That's a one-dimensional view of a multidimensional problem.

How Policy Changes Are Reshaping Aging in America, by Allison Buffett et al., bipartisanpolicy.org, July 27, 2026

America's older adults are a growing share of the population, but the systems meant to support them haven't kept up. Older adults and their families struggle to access essential services and barriers hit hardest for select populations, such as people with disabilities, individuals with low incomes, veterans, and rural communities.

Policymakers have taken steps to strengthen the nation's aging system, which provides services to millions of older adults, people with disabilities, and family caregivers. However, progress has been slow, and the existing challenges are worsening as the baby boomer generation ages. Continued inaction will leave Americans without the supports they need to age with dignity, harming older adults and their families while driving up avoidable federal and state costs.

Housing for an Older America: From 'Aging in Place' to 'Aging in Community', by Frances Nguyen, shelterforce.org, July 21, 2026

The debate over aging in place is shifting from how to keep older adults in their homes to what kinds of communities allow people to age safely, affordably, and with dignity.

Longer lifespans, evolving household structures, and growing care needs are changing what people need from their homes and communities. In this Under the Lens series, Shelterforce examines what it means to live in an aging society, how families are adapting to the realities of growing older, and the housing policies and solutions that can help support aging safely, affordably, and connected to one another. Public Charge Final Rule: What Advocates Need to Know

Aug 26, 2026 @ 2:00 PM

Host: Justice in Aging

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS), published a new rule regarding public charge determinations, which will negatively impact certain older immigrants and their families. Public charge determinations are relevant for people seeking admissibility into the United States and people seeking to adjust their immigration status to Lawful Permanent Resident (LPR), also known as "green card" holders. The new rule enables immigration officers to consider a wide variety of factors when determining if someone may depend on the government as their main source of support in the future. The new rule takes effect September 18, 2026.

In this webinar, presenters will provide an overview of the new public charge rule, including what has changed from the previous rule, and provide advocates with resources to stay up-to-date on public charge changes. This webinar will be most important for legal and aging services providers who work with older immigrants and immigrants with disabilities on public benefits issues or immigration-related matters.

After attending this presentation, participants will:

- Understand the federal laws and new regulation on the public charge grounds of inadmissibility;
- Gain strategies on how to advise older immigrant clients who may have questions about public charge determinations and use of benefits; and
- Access resources to learn more about public charge as the new rule is implemented.

Dear SLFRF recipient:

We are writing to inform you that the U.S. Department of the Treasury (Treasury) updated the frequently asked questions (FAQs) for the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program regarding expending funds for closeout costs by April 30, 2027, among other expenditure-related issues. There is no action required at this time. Recipients should review [FAQs 17.24 -17.28](#) posted on [Treasury's website](#).

As a reminder, recipients were required to obligate SLFRF funds by December 31, 2024. Recipients must expend SLFRF funds by December 31, 2026, except for Surface Transportation projects and Title I projects, for which recipients must expend SLFRF funds by September 30, 2026. Recipients may expend funds to cover closeout costs until the final Project and Expenditure Report is due on April 30, 2027 (120 calendar days after the period of performance ends on December 31, 2026). Funds not expended by the applicable deadline must be returned to Treasury.

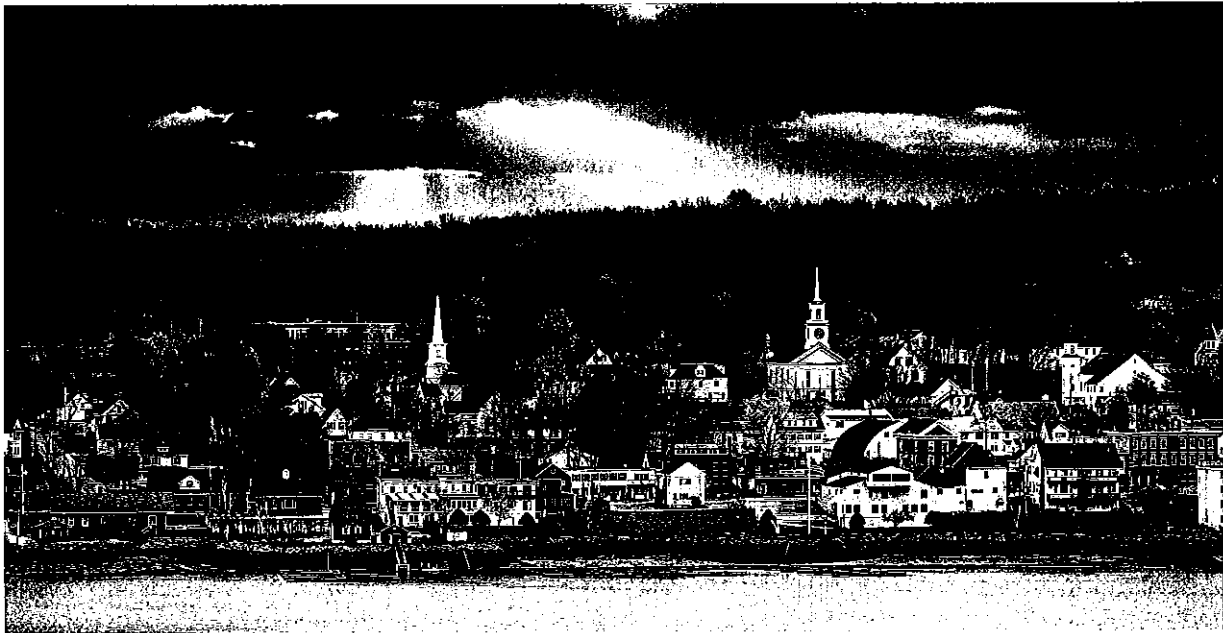

Director's Report

July was a month of exciting changes for MOCA.

First, you may have noticed that we have a new look.

Over the past year, MOCA has been creating our identity as friendly, approachable, and collaborative with communities.

Now, we have a logo to reflect that.

The logos for the Community Resilience Partnership, Maine Coastal Program, and Volunteer Maine will remain the same, but, as you'll see in our Program Updates section, we also now have logos for the Division of Building Codes and Standards, Floodplain Management Program, Housing Opportunity Program, Municipal Planning Assistance Program, and State Resilience Office.

And, of course, for our newest addition: the Manufactured Housing Program.

As of July 2026, the Manufactured Housing Program (MHP) is part of MOCA. MHP regulates manufactured housing and the parks in which many HUD-code homes are placed to ensure safety and quality for residents and clear and efficient regulatory processes for the industry. We see the program as an essential part of meeting housing goals that are such a high priority for Maine people.

The legislature directed MOCA to take a look at how the system works today and improve it, bringing to bear MOCA's resources for technical assistance. Starting in September 2026, MOCA will host public webinars, targeted stakeholder meetings, and at least one public meeting to gather feedback and discuss potential legislative proposals. 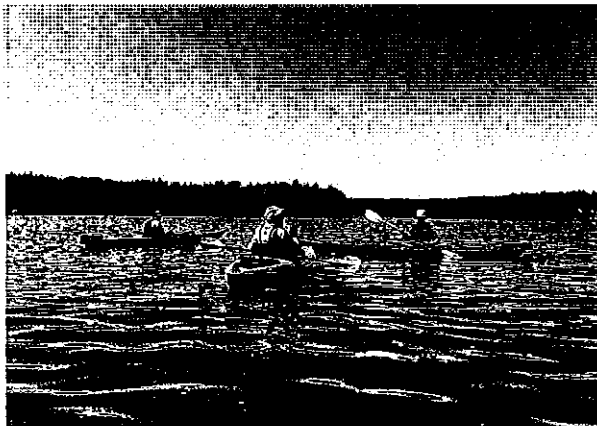

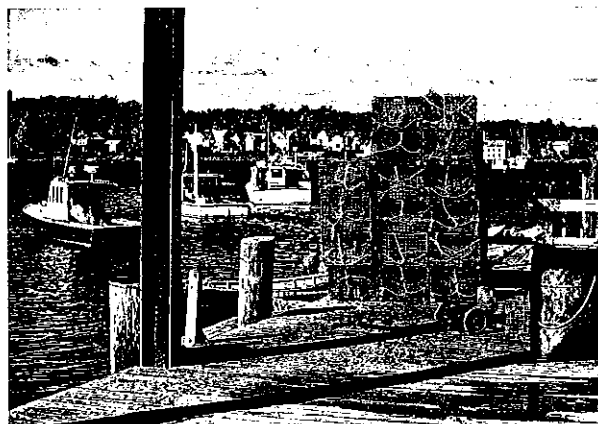

The **Community Resilience Partnership (CRP)** visited the Towns of Berwick and Eliot. In Berwick, staff visited the town's new community garden, funded in part by a Round 3 Community Action Grant. In two years, the Town designed and constructed a community garden for residents to grow their own produce, and for the garden volunteers to grow thousands of pounds of additional produce for donation. In Eliot, which received Round 3 and 6 Community Action Grants for conducting a vulnerability assessment and extreme weather emergency planning, CRP staff met with town leaders and a committee volunteer to discuss priority climate action-related projects and their innovative approaches to tackling these issues.

The **Division of Building Codes and Standards (DBCS)** is in the midst of

contracting for new certification exams and training related to the current adoption of the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code (MUBEC), as well as shoreland zoning and land use regulations.



The **Housing Opportunity Program (HOP)** released a revised guidance document with density visuals to provide additional support to municipalities and the general public about LD 1829, LD 997, and LD 427. This document is in the process of being updated to include LD 2173 changes.



Former **Floodplain Management Program (FMP)** Manager Sue Baker's last day was July 21. We all wish Sue well in her retirement and thank her for her many years of service to the state! In the interim, all inquiries about FMP can be directed to Janet Parker, janet.parker@maine.gov.



On July 17, Dever Domeyer, coastal resiliency specialist at the **Maine Coastal Program (MCP)**, led the first of three guided educational paddles through the eelgrass beds of Great Salt Bay to promote a seven-year eelgrass restoration project led by MCP. MCP also partnered with Bureau of Parks and Lands to create educational signs for Ferry Beach State Park. Finally, NOAA is in the process of conducting a routine



evaluation of the program's performance since 2017. MCP staff are grateful for the participation of so many program partners!

The **Municipal Planning Assistance Program (MPAP)** is in the midst of rewriting the comprehensive planning rule and is starting work on redrafting the subdivision law, as directed by the legislature. It will be a very busy fall!



The **State Resilience Office (SRO)** and the University of Maine signed a cooperative agreement to develop new flood maps for un- and under-mapped regions of the state. The University will hire graduate students and partner with the US Geological Survey's Northeast Water Science Center, based in Augusta, to develop FEMA flood maps for approximately 13,500 square miles of the state. Additionally, SRO's Flood Ready Maine initiative is contracting with each of the 10 regional councils to launch the Regional Floodplain Management Assistance Partnership. This offering, funded by LD 1, partners with the regional councils to provide floodplain management assistance to municipalities statewide.

Volunteer Maine is conducting a comprehensive statewide engagement effort to inform Maine's next State Service Strategy, which will establish statewide volunteerism priorities for



2027–2030. Through in-person and virtual regional listening sessions across the state and targeted conversations with key sector leaders, Volunteer Maine is gathering diverse perspectives on Maine's most pressing community needs, and the role service and volunteerism can play in addressing them. Additionally, Volunteer Maine was recently awarded a grant from the highly competitive AmeriCorps Volunteer Generation Fund. The grant will fund a project that strives to strengthen capacity of nonprofit organizations across Maine to recruit, train, and retain volunteers through the development of regional volunteer collaboratives.

With the increase in sightings of white sharks along Maine's coast, particularly near southern Maine beaches, we encourage visitors to take the following precautions:

Avoid excessive splashing - splashing might mimic an injured fish.

Avoid wearing shiny jewelry - jewelry reflects light like fish scales.

Avoid swimming at dawn or dusk and swim with a buddy - It's important to swim when you can see what's around you, and with a buddy in case help is needed.

Stay close to shore or near lifeguards.

Don't swim near people fishing.

Don't swim near schools of fish or seals - It's important to stay away from animals or scents that could attract sharks.

Be careful near steep drop-offs and sandbars - This is where sharks sometimes like to hunt.

Pay attention to signs and lifeguard instructions regarding sharks.

If you see a white shark, you can be part of the citizen science community and report it on the Atlantic White Shark Conservancy's Sharktivity phone app -

PROCLAMATION OF THE GEORGETOWN SELECT BOARD

Declaring Georgetown a Working Waterfront Community

Adopted _____, 2026

WHEREAS, Georgetown's identity, history, economy, and culture are deeply connected to the waters, shores, coves, islands, harbors, mudflats, wharves, boatyards, marinas, and marine businesses that have sustained generations of residents, families, and enterprises; and

WHEREAS, Georgetown has long been home to a vibrant and diverse working waterfront that includes, among other activities and enterprises, lobstering, clamming, aquaculture, worming, commercial harvesting, boatyards, marinas, marine services, and supporting businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board recognizes that working waterfront activities are essential to Georgetown's local economy, maritime heritage, food systems, public access, and sense of place; and

WHEREAS, Georgetown seeks to protect, support, promote, and advocate for a commercial marine base that remains successful, resilient, diverse, and in harmony with the broader community; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board recognizes that residents, businesses, visitors, real estate professionals, and prospective property owners benefit from clear public notice that Georgetown is, and intends to remain, a working waterfront community; and

WHEREAS, the Select Board further recognizes the importance of maintaining natural resources, waterways, infrastructure, and access that allow current and future commercial marine enterprises, residents, and visitors to engage with and benefit from Georgetown's working waterfront; and

WHEREAS, this proclamation is intended as a public affirmation of community values and priorities and does not create fines, penalties, enforcement provisions, or restrictions beyond those otherwise provided by applicable law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED by the Georgetown Select Board that the Town of Georgetown is hereby declared to be a **Working Waterfront Community**.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that Georgetown proudly and publicly affirms its intention to remain a welcoming Working Waterfront Community that supports the people, families,

businesses, and marine enterprises that depend upon and contribute to the Town's waterfront.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Select Board encourages public understanding of the vital role of the working waterfront and the conditions needed for it to thrive, including continued attention to access, infrastructure, natural resources, and balanced community development.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Town will endeavor to communicate this designation through appropriate public means, including the Town website, outreach to Georgetown residents and businesses, the Maine Association of Realtors and signage or other notices as determined by the Select Board.

BE IT FURTHER PROCLAIMED that the Select Board supports efforts to preserve Georgetown's working waterfront character while respecting applicable Town, County, State, and Federal laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Georgetown Select Board adopts this Proclamation on the date written above.
