The Meeting: The meeting was conducted as a Zoom hybrid. Selectboard Members Aria Eee, Katie Goodwin, and Kathy Gravino, Town Administrator Tyler Washburn, and Finance Director Mary McDonald were together in the Town Office. There were 19 members of the public in attendance in person or on Zoom.

Most Important/Interesting Items: In my judgment, the following items were the most important things covered during the meeting.

- The citizen petition regarding increasing the number of selectboard members was rejected on advice of legal counsel.
There is a technical issue regarding calling for selectboard elections in November. It may be possible for the Selectboard to add the question of the number of selectboard members to the warrant for Town Meeting 2026. However, elections for any additional selectboard members could not happen until Town Meeting 2027 because Georgetown selectboard members can only be elected at Town Meeting except in the case of a special election for a midterm replacement. Our June election is part of our Town Meeting

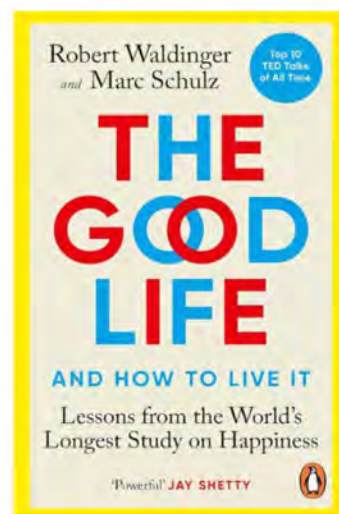

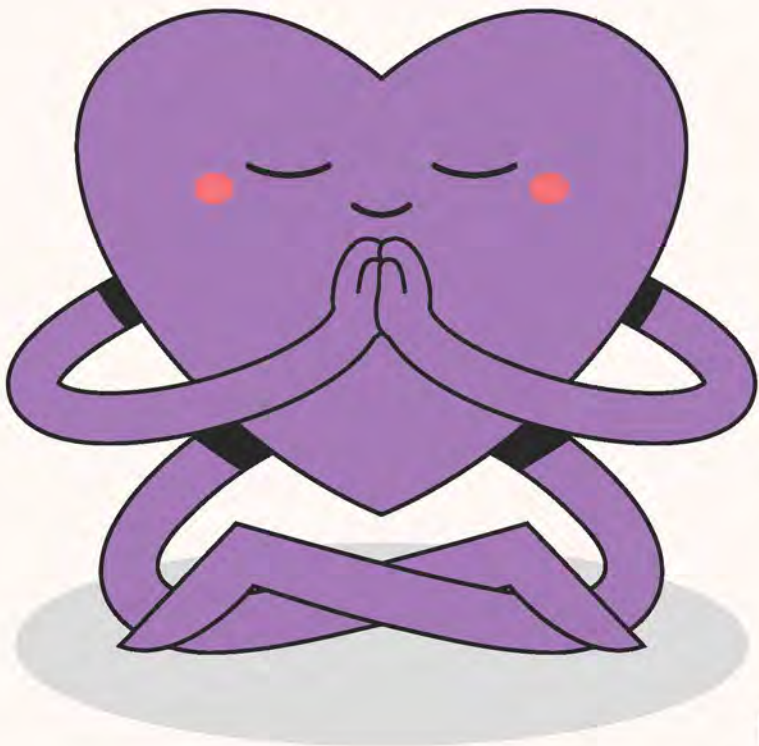

Towards the right of the bar there is an inner dining area we call the Nest. Towards the left of the bar there is a door to a small outside deck. Behind the bar there are window table's that look out to the marina.(Those area's are called the tavern and porch sections) If you walk through the porch area there is a back stair case that brings you to the front lawn. That is roped off with picnic tables. We have a beverage cooler in the service station (when you fist walk into the kitchen) and a walk in cooler towards the back of the Kitchen. We also have dry storage in the basement.

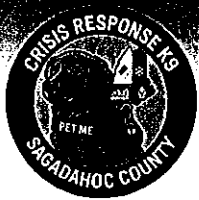

Those experiences have positioned our team with confidence and clarity as we look ahead to an exciting and resilient 2026.

Since becoming your Sagadahoc County Emergency Management Director in 2024, our agency has taken a thoughtful and intentional look at who we are and what we aspire to accomplish for our communities. Through meaningful collaboration and strong partnerships, we have worked to ensure our residents feel safe, supported, and empowered. This shared commitment to preparedness strengthens our ability to grow smarter and safer—before, during, and after any emergency—while preserving the strong sense of community that defines Sagadahoc County.

In 2025, Sagadahoc County EMA focused on delivering practical, strategic, and innovative solutions to the challenges we face every day. From preparedness outreach campaigns to long-term planning, and from enhanced responder support to expanded community engagement, our department has emerged as a leader in proactive emergency management. We are proud to inspire our communities to embrace readiness and resilience, truly embodying what it means to be **#CalmWithChaos**.

One of our most significant milestones this year has been the complete revitalization of the Sagadahoc County Emergency Operations Plan. This complex and collaborative effort required extensive coordination with stakeholders across the county. Through community guidance, the plan has been modernized to reflect current regulations, evolving technologies, and updated response protocols—ensuring it is both realistic and actionable when disaster strikes. In addition, SCEMA has launched strategic planning workshops and training focused on organizational readiness, equipment needs, training opportunities, and exercise support. I am proud to share that all our 2025 goals have been achieved, and these resilience-building efforts are now being actively showcased throughout the county.

We were also excited to welcome new talent to the SCEMA team this year. With the support of the Sagadahoc County Board of Health and Opioid Settlement Funding, we introduced two innovative positions to better serve our residents. Our new Community Navigator, Mark Hymbaugh, brings valuable experience from Lincoln County and is already making a meaningful impact by helping individuals and families connect with critical programs and resources. We also welcomed our new Deputy Director, Ashley Day, who joins us from Pennsylvania with a degree in Emergency Management and Homeland Security and extensive planning and exercise experience. Together, this growing team brings fresh perspectives and forward-thinking approaches that strengthen our ability to build safer, more resilient communities.

Sagadahoc County EMA is also proud to introduce Maine's first and only Crisis Response Canine Team. With the support of the Board of Health, County Commissioners, and our communities, K9 Chaos and I completed an extensive training program to better serve our residents during their most difficult moments. Trained to provide comfort, stability, and practical assistance, K9 Chaos supports both community members and first responders while addressing the human impact before, during, and after crises. Together, we are reinforcing our commitment to being truly **#CalmWithChaos**.

As we turn the page to 2026, SCEMA remains steadfast in its commitment to collaboration, innovation, and service to everyone who lives, works, plays, and travels in Sagadahoc County. Each of you plays a vital role in shaping our shared resilience. Guided by our mission and inspired by the promise of the future, we are ready to face emerging threats and hazards—together. Sagadahoc County EMA launched a fresh start to strengthen countywide emergency preparedness. By bringing together key partners, the program fosters collaboration, builds a shared vision, and ensures a united approach to keeping Sagadahoc County safe. This strengthens teamwork, improves readiness, and helps communities respond more effectively during any emergency.

Sagadahoc County completed the County's Integrated Preparedness Strategy (IPS). This strategy lays the groundwork and shared mission of our partners for our organization's priorities for the next five (5) years, particularly for plans, organizational, equipment, training, and exercise needs. This will allow all our partner organizations to constantly improve their capabilities needed to successfully respond to all emergencies and is reviewed semi-annually to ensure we are on target with what our communities need. Common themes shared by our partners when it came to the 5-year IPS included:

Our focus on planning efforts in 2025 led to a complete revitalization of our emergency operations plan. To better assist our leaders in understanding their roles and responsibilities in an emergency, Sagadahoc County EMA converted our plan into an Emergency Support Function model. This took the county plan and moved it into a department-like model and allows responders to focus on their specific tasks. This effort streamlines roles, reduces confusion, and ensures critical needs are not overlooked. This model is also one that Federal workers use when they come into support during large-scale incidents, so it best aligns with not only local preparedness activities, but also national emergency management partners. There are fifteen (15) emergency support functions (ESFs). Since this is a huge undertaking, it was decided that it would be best to have at least three (3) to four (4) ESFs updated annually. Not only are we happy to report that we completed this task, but our office was able to collaborate with our partners to create six (6) ESFs.

SCEMA also updated the Sagadahoc County continuity plan. A continuity plan is essential for governments because it ensures that critical services can continue even during emergencies, disasters, or unexpected disruptions. It outlines how government operations will be maintained, who has authority to make decisions, and how essential functions such as public safety, healthcare, utilities, and communication will continue to run when normal systems are disrupted. Without a continuity plan, confusion and delays can occur at a time when residents need stability and clear leadership the most.

In partnership with the Sagadahoc County LEPC, the county updated the hazardous materials response plan. By keeping this plan updated, our communities and first responders are better prepared to handle any incident in which hazardous materials may be present.

Finally, SCEMA and our municipal emergency managers developed a plan to show a vision for the future of emergency management in Sagadahoc County. This year, emergency management has faced many uncertainties. From not knowing how FEMA would be involved in future disasters to expanding community needs, SCEMA surveyed our municipal emergency managers on where they felt responsibility for specific emergency management missions should lie. This ensures that Sagadahoc County has a cutting-edge and leading emergency management program designed to protect lives, property, and the future of Sagadahoc County.



In 2025, SCEMA looked to start regionalization of specialized skills within the county. Many of our communities have been asking for teams that could assist them when unique situations called for specialized services. One of these specialized skills that municipal leaders were looking for was a drone task force team. Our team is made up of 10 individuals including EMA, Law Enforcement, Fire, and Rescue personnel. Depending on the type of mission, SCEMA can call upon the team to assist in missions such as searching for lost or missing persons, damage assessments, mapping, or gathering real-time information from areas that might not be easily accessible. We are looking to add more members to this team in 2026!

SCEMA also brought on board two new staff members. Through a collaboration with the Sagadahoc County Board of Health and County Commissioners, Sagadahoc County hired Mark Hymbaugh as a Community Navigator for county residents. Helping connect individuals and families with support services, Mark is a wealth of knowledge when it

comes to the various resources available throughout Sagadahoc County. Mark works closely with municipal assistance programs and helps residents bridge the gaps and reduce barriers when accessing complex systems. His focus remains on connecting residents with the appropriate services and resources that improve the whole community's quality of life.

In October 2025, SCEMA announced the hiring of Deputy Director, Ashley Day. After Hannah Dickinson went back to the Probate Court in February, the search for a new deputy director began. Ashley comes to Sagadahoc County EMA with a bachelor's degree in Emergency Management and Homeland Security, four (4) years as a squad leader in the United States Army, and a wealth of expertise in plan writing and exercise design. We are excited to have both of these members on board with SCEMA to help build community resilience before, during, and after every emergency.

Finally, through the Opioid Settlement Funding, SCEMA welcomed Maine's first and only crisis response canine, K9 Chaos. Most famously known by his tagline #CalmWithChaos, K9 Chaos and Director Davis completed training with Crisis Canines of the Midlands becoming a nationally certified crisis response canine team. Chaos is much more than a therapy or comfort dog. First, let me say that he is not anything like a police dog. He is trained to be a calming presence and provide emotional stability and grounding for people impacted by crisis. He is trained during high stress, loud and chaotic environments so that he can work alongside our first responders and support them. He is there to provide almost immediate relief from acute and long-term stress. Since K9 Chaos has been fully certified, our Crisis Response Team has been asked to attend 19 crisis/events, and Chaos has touched the lives of over 6,400 people throughout the state of Maine. He is the only certified crisis response canine in Maine and just one of two in the Northeast region of the United States. He is here to be the #CalmWithChaos before, during, and after every critical incident.

EMERGENCY EXERCISE

Be Prepared – Your Safety Depends On It.

Emergency exercises are important because they allow organizations and communities to practice how they would respond to real emergencies before lives are at risk. By simulating disasters or crises, responders can test plans, communication, and coordination, identify gaps or weaknesses, and improve teamwork among agencies. These exercises help people become more confident in their roles, reduce confusion during actual events, and ensure that resources can be deployed quickly and effectively. Practicing in advance ultimately leads to faster, safer, and more organized responses when real emergencies occur.

SCEMA led and supported several emergency exercises throughout the year. Sagadahoc County worked with local communities to conduct drills focused on school reunification, vague threats against elected officials, fire response, and site evacuations. These exercises helped community partners and responders clarify roles and responsibilities while identifying opportunities for improvement to strengthen coordinated response efforts. As a result of this proactive training, when real emergencies occurred, agencies demonstrated strong teamwork and cooperation, and most incidents were resolved within a few hours. Strengthening our collaboration and teamwork with our communities and responders will always remain a top priority year after year.

Training Announcements

SCEMA and our community partners continued to learn the latest and greatest ways to handle any emergency. Through training courses, students are able to gather foundational

knowledge and a common view of the overall mission. Each year, SCEMA looks for training courses that will assist our partners with updating their plans, suggest new procedures, and to learn from real-world experiences of others. This collaborative effort ensures that Sagadahoc County leaders understand the risks and known consequences during a crisis.

In 2025, SCEMA hosted a NIMS Overview for Senior and Elected Officials course. This course provides our elected leaders with a foundational understanding of the roles they play in their community to keep everyone safe. We discuss why using incident command and a common language is important. We also help them understand how they can best support their responders and community needs before, during, and after all emergencies.

SCEMA also worked with our local, state, and federal partners to develop the county's capability and risk assessment tool. This tool is to address Sagadahoc County's capability gaps when it comes to large emergencies. By using this information, SCEMA can prioritize our training needs within the county to address the gaps that were identified.

SCEMA also attended training involving crisis communications, protecting critical infrastructure, mass care and shelter operations, evacuation planning, and hazard mitigation. SCEMA also worked with community leaders and attended training on what would be needed for a community point of dispensing or distribution site. Director Davis completed certification for the Crisis Response Canine team and has become trained in mental health first aid. All of these training courses allow our staff to assist in developing plans and policies to protect the communities and residents before, during, and after any crisis.



SCEMA remains firmly committed to ensuring all equipment is mission-ready to support effective emergency response and operational success. This commitment includes maintaining and updating existing equipment to extend its service life while improving reliability and performance. At the same time, SCEMA recognizes the importance of adopting the latest proven technologies to enhance capabilities, efficiency, and responder safety. These investments are carefully evaluated and prioritized to ensure they deliver clear operational value. By balancing readiness, modernization, and innovation with

thoughtful planning and oversight, SCEMA strives to be a responsible steward of taxpayer funds while continuing to meet the evolving needs of the communities it serves.

This year, our department made investments in programs and equipment that support a regionalized approach to having equipment available for all agencies within the county. Not only does this make our office a centralized hub for equipment needs, but it also addresses any budget gaps that some departments may face and eliminates any duplication of specialized equipment.

What most people may not know, Sagadahoc County EMA relies heavily on grant funding to make these investments. SCEMA received the following grants to make investments in the equipment owned by SCEMA:

Emergency Management Performance Grant*: \$ 65,142.94
Homeland Security Grant Program*: \$91,350.93
Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation: \$20,000
Enbridge Community Grant: \$5,000
Opioid Settlement Funding: \$18,000
Hazard Mitigation Grant Program*: \$141,014.53
Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness Grant: \$9,427.58
Total grants received: \$349,935.98

*This is an estimate as final numbers have not been determined at this time.

Because of this grant funding, we were able to fully implement some cutting-edge technology to support our communities. Sagadahoc County. This year, Sagadahoc County implemented a countywide platform allowing us to keep track of all resources along with contact information and location. This will help us preposition equipment and personnel whenever disaster strikes. It also allows for municipalities to track the resources used into a single platform, as well as providing them with an estimated cost for the event. This will be a game-changer when it comes to resource tracking in the future.

SCEMA assisted our law enforcement partners in purchasing variable message board signs and two new speed trailers in the county. These signs not only help with communications during a disaster but also assist our law enforcement partners in enforcing speed complaints they receive, by capturing data and making our streets safer.

This year, we were also able to address a relatively new hazard our communities face. With an increased presence of electric and hybrid vehicles, SCEMA was able to purchase emergency fire blankets and emergency vehicle plugs for all our responders. When these alternative fuel vehicles catch fire, they pose serious hazardous material risks to those responding. These tools will assist our responders whenever an alternative fuel vehicle is involved in a fire or even an accident. These tools will also assist in preventing the spread of the fire, protecting lives, property and the environment.

Through grant funds, SCEMA was able to purchase a thermal drone for county responders and the Sagadahoc County Drone Task Force team. This drone can be used to assist with missing or lost person searches, location of hazardous material releases not easily accessible by foot, damage assessments, and so many other events. This technology allows our responders to work more safely and make more informed decisions when they are called upon in dangerous situations.



Sagadahoc County EMA maintains the RAVE mass notification system. This ensures timely, accurate, and accessible communication to the public during emergencies. SCEMA continues to enhance coordination with local agencies to streamline messaging and outreach through multiple platforms. This includes our social media platforms and other community networks. We were even able to coin our very first tagline in the county because of Crisis Response Canine, K9 Chaos. All his posts can be followed using the hashtag #CalmWithChaos. Through ongoing training and exercises, our public alert and warning program supported public safety officials by issuing alerts for critical incidents, public safety emergencies, and weather events that impacted our communities.

SEAMaine is seeking applications for the Seafood Infrastructure Adaptation Fund (SIAF). SIAF makes available \$1,000,000 for targeted investments to qualifying energy efficiency conversions and supply chain adaptations to seafood infrastructure in public facilities. Seafood infrastructure refers to facilities related to commercial fishing, aquaculture, and seafood production and supply chain. Eligible applicants include municipal, county, state and tribal government entities, or non-profits, business owners, private property owners, and educational organizations representing publicly owned infrastructure. All project construction activities must be located on publicly owned land, tribal land, or land where a public entity holds a lease or easement that demonstrates adequate public interest. Public access would be one example of sufficient public interest.

The grant will fund projects between \$75,000 and \$300,000 with a five percent match required.

Due to the updated federal rules regarding controlled substances the Georgetown Fire Department will be required to significantly upgrade our physical storage for all controlled substances. We will need to be able to always store and track access to them.

These vaults will have unique access codes for each EMS provider. They will have wireless communication with the software which will enable us to track who has access and when. This system will bring us into compliance with the new rules and allow us to maintain the same level of care that we currently provide. The KNOX Vault system is used by many EMS agencies locally and nationally. It is secure, user friendly, and will work for our service.

The cost of the vaults is \$8,392.53 for all three. There will be additional expenses related to professional installation to connect them to vehicle electrical systems. I am currently working to find out how much this will cost.

I believe it will be beneficial to get in our order ASAP since EMS agencies all over the country are all working toward this same goal.
